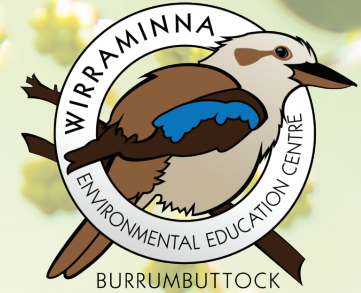
Wirraminna offers many opportunities for volunteers to be involved on either a regular or casual basis.

WHO WE ARE AND WHAT WE DO

We are a non-government, independently funded Environmental Education Centre and tourist stop in the heart of Burrumbuttock, north of Albury NSW, that was started in the early 1990s. We represent a model for landcare projects that aim to restore native vegetation and wetlands on farms to redress problems of declining biodiversity.

Wirrainna is a public park developed and maintained by volunteers. We are open all year round to visitors, 7 days a week.

The gardens and natural woodland contain many locally rare native shrubs, wildflowers and grasses which attract a range of animals such as native bees, frogs around the waterways, skinks, many bird species, possums and the threatened Squirrel Glider.

OUR DISCOVERY CENTRE

Our Discovery Centre is a beautiful rammed earth building, used for education purposes and events. It houses many resources and displays including an endangered Southern Corroboree frogs enclosure, native fish displays, a native animal taxidermy collection and a small library of reference books available to borrow.
